

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## A special 'first footer' visits Bessie Dunlop Court

Early in January we were delighted to welcome **Maree Todd MSP, Minister for Social Care, Mental Wellbeing and Sport to Bessie Dunlop Court in Dalry**. Whilst there, Miss Todd had the opportunity to meet a number of the people we support and to chat with some of the Ayrshire winners from Cornerstone's recent STAR Awards.

Maree Todd MSP said:

**"Visiting Bessie Dunlop Court was truly inspiring. It was an honour to meet with Alison, Shannon, Kerryann and of course, baby Lily and to hear their stories whilst seeing the positive impact the services delivered by Cornerstone have had in aiding them to live independently. Everyone at Cornerstone is driven to provide the best possible support and I congratulate all the staff for their dedication and commitment."**

Carly Nesvat, Cornerstone Branch Leader for Ayrshire commented:

**"It was great to have the opportunity to welcome Maree Todd MSP to Bessie Dunlop Court and tell her all about the care and support we provide. As she chatted with staff and the people we support, she was able to hear and see first-hand, the real difference that great social care is making to the lives of the people we support with learning disabilities.**

**We also took the opportunity to stress the significant challenges and pressures currently being faced by the social care sector and the urgent need for an increase in the hourly rate, and additional funding, if our skilled and valued colleagues are to be able to stay in the jobs they love."**

As part of a walking tour of the development, one resident, Alison, invited Miss Todd in for a chat and to meet her cat Leo! Alison was able to give a first-hand account of the opportunities and independence that maintaining her own tenancy at Bessie Dunlop Court has granted her, including allowing her to work part-time within two jobs – one locally within Dalry and one further afield in Clydebank!

David Harkins, Lead Practitioner at Bessie Dunlop Court commented:

**"Our staff are very proud of the services we are able to deliver, providing flexible, person-centred care to the people we support at Bessie Dunlop Court. For some, living here has been absolutely transformative. One individual, who was previously supported on a 2:1 basis within another housing complex, is now able to live with limited hours of support per week in his own tenancy. Another individual who came to Bessie from a long stay ward with tailored support, is now able to have control over his own choices, feeling safe to do so, whilst having support staff on site should he require it.**


**It was good to hear Miss Todd's recognition of the invaluable care and support we provide and hope that her visit will serve to provide the Scottish Government with even more evidence of the positive impact great social care can undoubtedly have, as well as the imperative need for an adequately funded and resourced sector."**

## A life-changing transplant

Cornerstone started supporting Sarah in Nov 2019 in her own home. Sarah had renal failure and her kidney was not functioning well; she was required to lose three stone to be fit enough to make the transplant waiting list. Sarah and her team have worked incredibly hard over the last few years and Sarah has lost four stone in total, maintaining a healthy diet and exercise routine.

Sarah has required dialysis from Jan 2023, attending the renal unit twice a week, with support from her staff team. Sarah found this challenging but did remarkably well especially when it looked like dialysis wouldn't continue but no one gave up on Sarah, advocating and fighting her corner, sourcing more training, and trying every possible avenue to ensure it continued. The pressure Sarah's team, and Sarah were under cannot be underestimated.

On the 15th of Dec 2023 Service Lead Ashley received a phone call from Sarah's social worker to advise that she had a call from the transplant coordinators to advise there was a potential match for Sarah! The team had years of planning for this moment, adapting countless times, working closely with numerous medical professionals on Sarah's health team and her social workers to have a streamlined and full proof plan.

That night Sarah got her kidney transplant! Staff spent just over a week in hospital with Sarah, taking it in turns for two staff to travel to Edinburgh, handover to the other two staff and come home every three days. Sarah was back home in time for Christmas. Absolutely the best Christmas present for everyone involved!

Sarah continues to do remarkably well; she is just waiting to get back to all her groups after 'shielding' for 12 weeks and has just celebrated her 50th Birthday in February.

Service Lead Ashley Aitken added **"I cannot emphasise enough the immense admiration, pride and respect I have for both Sarah and her team. The team at Packman have been asked time and time again to go above and beyond the call of duty and have always done so without a single complaint.**



**The dedicated staff team have had to undergo specialist training, in supporting Sarah at dialysis. They needed to know how to check fistula's worked, learn and support Sarah with all the changes in dietary requirements and restrictions, change their plans; work at short notice to attend medical appointments/clinics. Supporting Sarah through all the triumphs and tribulations along the way.**

**I've never seen more exhausted, yet happier (and very, very emotional) staff as I did when I visited Sarah in ERI. The staff were exhausted, required to sleep at Sarah's beside on chairs. You'd never know Sarah had just undergone major, life-changing surgery, she was 'just oor Sarah'. She called me the night after her surgery and I won't lie, I cried when she told me 'I've got a new kidney!'**

**I can't wait to see what Sarah does with her new lease of life, if one thing's for sure – whatever she does it will be amazing!"**



## Rethink to 13

We are proud to support the Coalition of Care and Support Providers in Scotland's (CCPS) Rethink to 13 campaign which calls upon the Scottish Government to rethink commitments on pay for social care staff in the 2024-25 Budget.

The campaign urges the government to increase pay to at least £13 per hour for all social care staff from April, as part of a published timetable to achieve Fair Work.

In the run-up to the Budget being debated and passed at the end of February CCPS members have been sharing views, videos and stories from support workers focusing on the work they do, the impact they make – and the difference investment would have on them and the people they support.

## Awards success



We are so proud of our Shared Lives team who not only were awarded Team of the Year at our own Star Awards but were also recognised with a Highly Commended in the 'Putting People First' Category at the Great British Care Awards (GBCA) in Newcastle towards the end of last year!

Demonstrating their innovative approach to care, and as part of their GBCA nomination, Shared Lives were Highly Commended for recognising that people with learning disabilities have the same rights as anyone else to build a family and for promoting a supported parenting approach. By providing person-centered support, the team were successful this year in supporting two mums who were navigating parenthood; learning new skills in loving homes with Shared Lives Carers and having opportunities to thrive in the right environment.

Kerryann and Baby Lily were one of the families supported:

In September 2022, Kerryann found out that she was going to become a mum! With support from Cornerstone's Shared Lives Ayrshire service and her amazing Shared Lives Carers, Sandra and Stephen, baby Lily was born on the 22nd May 2023. It was a special, emotional, and proud moment for everyone. Kerryann said **"I am loving being a mum, caring for my baby girl and learning as I go. I'm so happy Lily is healthy and thriving, while I start this next journey of being a parent with the support and advice from Cornerstone Shared Lives, and Sandra and Stephen."**

Kerryann has also had the opportunity to share her experience with the Shared Lives Plus parenting project and has been at the helm of new national guidance. She is also influencing the work of Shared Lives schemes across Scotland and the UK.

Shared Lives Family Placement Lead – Marissa Speed commented: **'Statistically between 40–60% of people with learning disabilities who become parents risk having their children removed. Our work has directly shaped new, national guidance 'Supporting Parents in Shared Lives' (Scotland) whilst pioneering closer partnership working with the Safeguarding Midwife Team and future parents. It's really clear from the Shared Lives experience that having the right support at the right time can enable people we support to achieve their aspirations and amazing outcomes.'**



## Calling new Shared Lives Carers

Our Marketing and Communications team were out and about recently interviewing Shared Lives Carers in the Scottish Borders, **for an upcoming campaign that aims to recruit more families, couples or individuals to the Shared Lives network.**

**Huge thanks go to Betty and James, Donna and Dylan and Patricia and Alistair for taking part and sharing their stories.**

Shared Lives is similar to fostering, helping people aged 16 and over with a wide range of disabilities, conditions and other support needs to live in their local community, by matching them with an approved carer. Carers share their home, family and community life with the person they are supporting, whilst providing them with the care they require in an inclusive and homely environment. Every placement is unique, with the support provided being tailored to meet the individual needs of each person. This includes people with learning disabilities or mental health issues, older adults and also young people being supported through transitional services. Placements can be offered on a full-time, short break or day support basis.

Marissa Speed, Family Placement Lead for Shared Lives Borders explains: **"Shared Lives is making a huge difference to the lives of adults with disability and support needs in the Scottish Borders. We have now developed this support and established a Shared Lives community here over recent years and we are now looking to recruit more. Becoming a Shared Lives Carer can be such an enriching experience and we are actively looking for a range of people from diverse backgrounds and with a wide variety of life experiences"**.

Donna and Dave started their Shared Lives Carer journey in 2021. They have been supporting Dylan since late last year and are really enjoying providing the support for Dylan and helping him to develop his skills and interests in his new home and community.

Donna says:

**"Being a Shared Lives Carer is what I believe I was born to do, I have cared for others my whole life. Dylan has very quickly become family. Dave and myself could not imagine our world without him now."**


Jackie, Dylan's mum expressed how appreciative she is of the support that Donna and Dave provide to Dylan. She stated:

# Menopause Friendly accreditation

This year, we were delighted to be the first social care employer in Scotland to achieve full 'Menopause Friendly' accreditation as a mark of our commitment to ensuring Cornerstone is a menopause friendly and supportive employer.

The Menopause Friendly Accreditation is established by **Henpicked: Menopause In The Workplace** and recognises high standards and proven practices that embrace menopause in the workplace. It is an industry-recognised, mark of excellence and is the only accreditation that sets clear standards which must be met in supporting menopause in the workplace.

As part of applying for accreditation, our submission was assessed by an Independent Panel, and **we successfully evidenced effectiveness in six key areas, namely: culture, policies and practices, training, engagement, facilities and evaluation.**

We were recognised for our commitment working towards long-term, sustainable change in our workplace and fostering an inclusive menopause friendly culture. From manager awareness workshops and a raft of online resources, to 'Your Menopause Journey' virtual sessions and the resourcing of lending libraries of books on the topic across our hubs and offices, we have done so much to help raise awareness.

With over 78% of our workforce being female, and 45% being between the ages of 35–55, it is vitally important that we better understand the impact of perimenopause, menopause, and postmenopause and identify ways in which we, as an organisation, can better support those experiencing symptoms.

We are proud to be the first social care employer in Scotland to be accredited and to be part of a group of inspirational, pioneering employers who are changing the way people think about menopause and are putting the right support in place. We have been recognised as an inclusive employer that takes the wellbeing of our colleagues seriously.

# Scottish Government Consultation

The Scottish Government's consultation on Learning Disabilities, Autism & Neurodivergence Bill has been launched. It outlines:

**“People with learning disabilities and neurodivergent people are unique individuals who, like all of us, have potential to develop, skills to offer, and vibrant lives to lead connected to their families and communities. They may think differently and see and experience the world differently. This shouldn't cause them to be marginalised, stigmatised, disadvantaged or excluded”.**

**“Scotland's diversity is our strength. We are committed to building a country that ensures equality of opportunity for all by embedding equality, inclusion and human rights into everything that we do. By better protecting, respecting and championing the rights of**



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**people with learning disabilities and neurodivergent people, all of Scotland can benefit. This consultation on proposals for a Learning Disabilities, Autism and Neurodivergence Bill seeks the views of everyone on how we can do this”.**



## Training Academy



## Happy, safe and secure

As part of being an expert social care provider it is important our colleagues know how to keep both themselves, and the people we support, safe from harm. **Underpinning this is a Positive Behaviour Support (PBS) approach; an approach that is recognised as best practice, and is both values-led and evidence-based.**

PBS aims to improve the quality of a person's life by developing a deep understanding of any behaviours that challenge. It uses holistic assessment and person-centred support planning to enhance quality of life outcomes for both the person being supported and their support team. It is also central to our organisational values of being caring, person-centred, professional and pioneering.

As part of adopting a PBS approach it is important that we equip colleagues with the skills and tools to provide the right support at the right time in the right way, helping the people we support to fulfil their potential and live the best life possible. **We are therefore proud to recently partner with IKON to deliver training in conflict resolution and breakaway techniques.** Tim Hanwell, a trainer from IKON, has delivered a number of courses within some of our Branches and our trainers have now been accredited to deliver this course going forward. IKON are registered with UK charity BILD as complying with the Restraint Reduction Network training standards.

The course focuses strongly on de-escalation and conflict management techniques that can be used to help the people we support to regulate their feelings and help them to feel happy, safe and secure. The breakaway techniques taught are used by colleagues to safely remove themselves from a situation that may put them and the person they support at risk, when de-escalation has failed. We believe firmly in giving the people we support choices and control over their everyday lives and through training aim to reduce the likelihood of needing any kind of restraint and restrictive practices. They will only ever be used as a last resort, if every other option has been exhausted.

Working with IKON helps us to take yet another step forward towards becoming an expert provider of care and support to people with learning disabilities, autism, and complex care, allowing us to focus on being proactive in our support, effectively de-escalate behaviours and providing our colleagues with appropriate breakaway techniques when absolutely needed.

**Over the delivered sessions, our colleagues have shown a deep, caring spirit and shared great ideas to implement into the care plans of the people they support with a view to ensuring they are happy, safe and secure.**

# Scottish Apprenticeship Week 2024

We were delighted to support Scottish Apprenticeship Week once again this year (4-8 March). The theme was **'Skills Generation'** recognising the role Scottish Apprenticeships have in harnessing people's skills, talents and abilities, to create the next generation of Scotland's skilled workforce.

**There are currently almost 40,000 apprentices in training across Scotland** and Scottish Apprenticeship Week aims to provide a nationwide celebration of apprenticeships and the benefits of work-based learning to people and employers in Scotland.

## Why did you decide to do the Modern Apprenticeship?

I chose to do the Modern Apprenticeship to gain new skills and implement them into my practice. It is a requirement to gain the Health and Social Care level 7 in line with the SSSC regulations.

## What sort of skills did you learn?

I gained new knowledge and skills by researching and reflecting on my practice as a support practitioner. It is a personal account kept by each individual within Cornerstone about our experiences and helps us to understand and learn more about each person, as well as how we can make amazing differences to their life.

I wish everyone the best of luck when they undergo their Modern Apprenticeship. Enjoy it, don't stress, and never forget your potential and what you're capable of!

## What was the most rewarding part of your Modern Apprenticeship?

The most rewarding part of my Modern Apprenticeship was realizing how much potential I have. I'm a keen learner and loved looking back at how I have supported people and how I have built positive and meaningful relationships with them. Completing this course in six months was one of the most rewarding and amazing things I have done. It has changed my practice in positive ways and shown what I'm capable of. I couldn't have done it without my assessors.



Cornerstone's Modern Apprenticeship (MA) programme gives people who are looking to pursue or develop a career in health and social care the opportunity to gain a sector recognised qualification whilst working in a paid role as a Support Practitioner. **To celebrate the week, we caught up with support practitioners, Natalie and Colin, to hear all about their Modern Apprenticeship experiences.**

## What sort of skills did you learn on the Modern Apprenticeship?

The assessments that I needed to complete required reflective written work of my own, combined with spending time studying and reading many documents on employer policy and legislation. To achieve this, I had to develop the skill of disciplining myself to study in my free time and create a study space that allowed me to focus on what I wanted to write. The information and knowledge gained from my studies on legislation and policy surrounding care will enable me to fulfil my role to a higher level. As a person who has spent the last 30 years working in other fields, undertaking a change in career has presented new challenges, however my studies and research have helped me to fill gaps in my knowledge and better understand what is expected of me in my role.

## What was the most rewarding part of your Modern Apprenticeship?

At the age of 50 it had been quite a few years since I undertook a commitment to gain a major qualification. Sitting down, staring at a blank screen was daunting, but the sense of achievement when completing each assessment and watching my progress was the encouragement needed to keep going. Feedback from my assessor Caroline was also essential and rewarding in letting me know that I was on the right track with my submitted work. My next goal is to finesse my Continuous Professional Learning log to bring it up to an even more professional level!

**Congratulations to both Natalie and Colin on completing their Modern Apprenticeship!**

## Skilled and qualified teams

Over the last six months the Training Academy Qualification team has continued to support colleagues across the organisation to achieve SQA qualifications. During this time period fifty one colleagues have completed awards.

- **Care Services Leadership and Management SCQF 10 (1)**
- **Modern Apprenticeships (Social Services and Healthcare SCQF 7 (4))**
- **PDA's in Supervision SCQF 7 (6)**
- **Social Services and Healthcare SCQF 6 (4)**
- **Social Services and Healthcare SCQF 7 (33)**
- **Social Services and Healthcare SCQF 9 (3)**

Through the Training Academy, colleagues have access to robust and ongoing training, equipping them with the skills and knowledge to carry out their job roles effectively. Once colleagues gain work experience and in line with their SSSC registration conditions they are then invited to undertake the relevant qualification for their roles.

Our team work hard to tailor SQA assessments to meet the individual needs of colleagues and this is a real strength of our centre, which the SQA has recognised. Colleagues appreciate the support their Assessors give them:

**"I would like to thank my Assessor Susan for taking the time to help me when I really needed it. I hadn't done anything like this since High School. So thank you again Susan."**

In a recent survey of colleagues who've completed awards with us 100% agreed that **"the assessment was delivered at an appropriate pace"** and 100% agreed that **"completing my SVQ/PDA has improved my work practice."**

Our Assessor team often work with colleagues throughout their Cornerstone career.


It was an all-round huge success where everyone enjoyed a well-deserved day out to get into the Christmas spirit.



## Aberdeen North and Shire

### Youth and Philanthropy Initiative

On Wednesday 28th February Branch Admin Louise McNeil, Lead Practitioner Gemma Mcrae and Cat Allan from the Fundraising Team attended a **Youth and Philanthropy Initiative (YPI) event at Mintlaw Academy, North Aberdeenshire.**

Over 200 secondary schools in Scotland participate in the YPI initiative, which is run by Wood, and is a mandatory course that pupils across differing year groups take part in. The young people begin their YPI experience by taking part in an introductory workshop, forming teams, and working together to identify the social issues that are prevalent in their own community. Once they have identified these social issues, students select one issue as their focus, and search for local grassroots charities that exist in their community. The teams then select the charity they believe best addresses their chosen issue, and begin preliminary research around the charity, its mandate, and its activities. **One winning group will receive a £3,000 grant for their chosen charity.** Through YPI, charities receive important funding from the youth of their community, and students – acting as young philanthropists – become powerful agents of social change.

The Cornerstone team had a great afternoon alongside a number of other charities including Scottish Blood Transfusion Service, Shirley's Space, and the Archie Foundation, speaking to 53 pupils, answering their questions on volunteering, donations and explaining what Cornerstone does in their local area. If successful, the Branch would spend the money organising monthly gatherings where the people we support can come together and participate in activities of their choosing.



## Rosa leading the way

Rosa attended a People First (Scotland) meeting at Perth Concert Hall with her support practitioner Corrine. Rosa sat proudly on their Board of Directors. People First is made up exclusively of people with learning difficulties and Rosa was elected by local members to represent them and their views.

It is People First's mission to make sure that people with learning disabilities have the same human rights as other people, to be able to choose where they live and who they live with, to have fair access to justice under the law and be free of discrimination and hate crime.

Rosa also smashed another goal recently by sourcing, organising and taking part in a first aid course with Albacare Ltd. She was trained in basic first aid and learnt how to instruct another person to give CPR and to also put someone in the recovery position. Rosa learnt how to treat burns and tend to wounds too. She passed with flying colours, achieved her goal and is now fully trained in Basic First Aid. She was presented with a certificate of achievement, a first aid guide and her very own first aid kit.

Rosa said "I have a disability but it doesn't stop me, it doesn't define who I am or what I can do".



## Super Steven!

In December, the Rankine Street team started to support a young gentleman who had previously lived with his mother. This was to be the first time he had been supported by an external organisation. When Steven moved into Rankine Street he had limited life skills, and his support team have worked hard alongside Steven to ensure he is as independent as possible. Within his first six weeks he has achieved the following:

- Healthier sleeping patterns - Steven used to wake up regularly at 4am but after a couple of days at Rankine Street he has been sleeping all night!
- Steven can make his bed, carry his washing to the washing machine, set the table for lunch and evening meal, clean the table, load the dishwasher, sweep the floors, and make his own packed lunch for day centre. He can also now drink from a cup and can use a fork as well as a spoon.

Amy, from our Barfillan service, got to tick something off her bucket list; she not only got to see her favourite singer, but she got to meet him too!


She said it was **"a fantastic end to the best concert ever, meeting Nathan Carter and having my photo taken with him, especially as he is so handsome".**

## Glitz and glam





## Happy birthday Marie!



## Fun in the sun


In January, Christopher went on holiday abroad for the very first time ever. Christopher and his two Support Practitioners, Linda and Libby visited Tenerife for some winter sun!


## Heather wins boccia tournament

## Jigsaw and Clasp

Back in November, families and Cornerstone employees were informed that Cornerstone's contract with Argyll and Bute Health and Social Care Partnership, to provide Jigsaw and Clasp children's services would sadly be coming to an end on 31st March 2024.

Hazel Brown, Chief Executive of Cornerstone said:

"We were very sorry to learn that our contract to provide care and support services to children and families across Argyll and Bute through our Jigsaw and Clasp services, will come to an end on 31st March 2024. Cornerstone and Argyll and Bute HSCP have tried to identify both increased core and additional grant funding to meet increasing costs, but unfortunately this has not been successful. As a not-for-profit and charitable care organisation, we are proud of all that has been achieved with our Jigsaw and Clasp services; the real difference the team has made and the compassionate, person-centred care and support they have been able to provide.

We appreciate the impact this decision will have on the families, children and young people we support and will do all that we can to maintain our support for the remainder of the contract and support any transition needs to a new care provider.


We are also working hard to support colleagues affected by this decision and I would like to take this opportunity to thank them sincerely for all that they have done in delivering exemplary care and support."
