Message from our Chief Executive, Hazel Brown

I can't believe that Christmas is upon us once again and that 2021 is already drawing to a close! It's been quite a year for all of us, as we adapt to living in the 'new normal'. Here at Cornerstone that means that the vast majority of the support we provide is now back to normal, adhering to guidance. However many of our non-operational colleagues still find themselves working virtually, from home. As we look to 2022, we will continue to explore ways in which we can safely get together and stay connected. The health and wellbeing of our colleagues and the people we support is paramount as we look to deliver safe, high-quality, person-centred care that is always in line with the latest government guidance.

We were delighted earlier this year to launch our new strategy 'Future-proofing Cornerstone'. The strategy has three key aims:

- 1. To be an expert provider of services to people with learning disabilities, autism and complex care needs.
- 2. To be the best employer in social care in Scotland.
- 3. To achieve stability and sustainability which supports future developments.

It has been developed following a full review of our previous strategy including discussions with colleagues across the organisation, people we support and their families. We listened very carefully to what people had to say and have focussed on what we are best at and how we can get even better in providing the best care and support that really makes a positive difference to people's lives. The new strategy also reflects upon the recommendations of the Scottish Government's Independent Review of Adult Social Care which was published earlier this year.

During the pandemic the social care sector has been very much in the news and it feels like the tide is finally turning in recognising the important role we play in providing pivotal and essential care and support to those in need throughout our communities. That includes those providing the care, finally receiving the recognition they deserve, as being skilled professionals in essential roles. There are still challenges ahead; there remain issues around funding for the sector and how services are commissioned which is not always necessarily centred on peoples' needs. However, the review and the follow-up consultation around a proposed National Care Service seem to be the start of some much-needed change. There's more about the consultation in this newsletter (right).

I do hope you enjoy our winter 2021 issue, it has certainly been a busy year for everybody in Cornerstone.

From all of us, we wish you an equally festive and fun-filled Christmas.

National Care Service

In February 2021, the Independent Review of Adult Social Care in Scotland (also known as The Feeley Review) was published. This report made several recommendations about improving adult social care including the creation of a National Care Service. It was proposed that a National Care Service would help to achieve consistency for people using social care services, drive improvement, set national standards, consider terms and conditions, and oversee local commissioning of services. The Scottish Government responded to the report by outlining what they plan to do to improve the way social care is delivered in Scotland and sought to consult with everyone impacted by the proposed changes.

Cornerstone participated in the recent consultation, seeking the views of colleagues and encouraging the people we support to also take part. Our organisational response was submitted at the beginning of November. In this, we urged the Scottish Government to adopt a truly personcentred, human-rights based approach where the people receiving care and support are also those who inform how the National Care Service is designed and delivered. We also supported proposals for the National Care Service to set standards of learning and development for social care workers. We advocated for them to be involved in the delivery of training whilst recognising the need for appropriate funding allocation to allow for the delivery of bespoke, specialist person-centred training by expert care providers where required.

In addition, we took the opportunity to stress the importance of immediate action and the need to focus on some key priorities that would help to alleviate some of the intense pressures currently being felt across the sector including recruitment, funding and challenges in service provision.

All the nationwide feedback is currently being analysed by the Scottish Government and the conclusions will be used to shape and develop new legislation (a bill) which will be introduced in the Scottish Parliament in summer 2022.

The legislation is likely to be extensive and complex and is likely to take at least a year to be scrutinised by the Parliament. After that the National Care Service would need to be set up and legislation put into effect. The Scottish Government has pledged that they intend the National Care Service to be fully functioning by the end of the Parliamentary term.



Quality care

Cornerstone's care and support services are registered with our regulator, the Care Inspectorate. We currently have 65 registrations covering our services from Moray to the Borders. Due to different ways of working during the pandemic, the regular schedule of inspections has been significantly impacted. However, inspectors have been in regular contact with our services providing ongoing advice and support, and we look forward to learning from future inspections.

Once restrictions started to ease our Chief Executive, Hazel Brown and Chair of the Quality Improvement Committee, Helen Munro enjoyed visits to two of our services that were awarded sectorleading grade 6 (Excellent) in their last inspections, shortly before the pandemic - CLASP in Dunoon and Baxter View in Dumbarton.

being introduced for new colleagues as
part of their induction, refreshing our
quality assurance processes, and further
developing our electronic personal
planning process, Access Care Planning.

All this will help us continue to deliver high quality services ensuring the people we support are always at the heart of everything we do.

As part of our new strategy, 'Future-proofing Cornerstone', colleagues Yvonne Kelly and Elaine Cochrane (below) have taken up new roles as Culture Leads, working closely with leaders in the organisation, supporting them to enhance their leadership skills and embrace a coaching approach, whilst also promoting a culture of empowerment and high performance.

Following a review of staff engagement and as part of our strategic aim 'to be the best employer in social care in Scotland', we are establishing a new Fair Work Partnership Forum.

The forum will be guided by the nationally-recognised Fair Work Convention's Framework and its five key dimensions: **effective voice**, **opportunity**, **security**, **fulfilment** and **respect**.

Working in collaboration with UNISON, the forum will look to improve the working lives of Cornerstone employees through applying fair work principles that are designed to drive success for everyone. It is integral to Cornerstone's new operating model and in line with the recommendations of the 2021 Feeley Review.

By adopting the Fair Work Framework, Fair Work Action Plans will be created to help improve employee engagement, representation and collective voice. Through these plans members could be involved in a whole range of initiatives – anything from wellbeing initiatives and improving terms and conditions, to staff surveys and organisational culture. Members are provided with a clear and specific role profile, dedicated training and personal development opportunities as well as protected time of four hours each month to fulfil their forum responsibilities.

Glad to Care Week

Back in July, we celebrated Glad to Care Week and the resilience of our amazing support workers, following what had been an unprecedented and challenging period for the social care sector. Each day of the week provided the people we support with opportunities to engage in exciting activities through daily themes. 'Monday Motivation' saw Anne and Sandy in Ayrshire, supported by Lorene, get involved in a Zoom dance session - they loved it! Team Packman in Moray took part in 'Wisdom Wednesday' by sharing their words of wisdom with our followers on social media, and on Friday, we went live with our Glad to Care auction.

Our Glad to Care auction contained some fantastic prizes, including a super luxurious night away at Stobo Castle Spa, complete with a Range Rover hire! Improving understanding of autism in the workplace

Research from our friends at the National Autistic Society shows that just 22% of autistic adults are in any kind of employment but at Cornerstone we recognise that autistic employees have many strengths and skills to share with employers.

To combat the employment barriers faced, Cornerstone's fundraising team are delighted to have secured £50,000 towards a project to improve understanding of autism amongst non-autistic people within a workplace setting. The project that is funded by the Scottish Government and managed by Inspiring Scotland will have two main phases:

Phase One: Cornerstone will undertake pioneering research in partnership with Heriot-Watt University, and other pilot partners (to be announced) from a range of different industries about the experiences of autistic people in getting and sustaining employment, and achieving good outcomes within the workplace. The research will also find out more about non-autistic managers' and leaders' knowledge, confidence and experience of supporting direct line reports who are autistic.

Phase Two: Cornerstone will support the autistic-led forums (created in each organisation as part of the research phase) to co-produce supportive training resources that will enable us to support more employers across Scotland to understand and improve the experience of autistic employees.

A different kind of drive

Cornerstone was chosen as the Charity of the Year for John Clark Motor Group alongside Aberdeen-based VSA in 2020. In loving memory of Linda Smedley

Tony, Stephen, Brian and their family completed a Ben Nevis hike in memory of their mum and much-loved wife, Linda Smedley. The Cornerstone team in North Lanarkshire supported Linda and her family after she was diagnosed with early-onset dementia aged just 50.

The family, along with their loved ones, made the challenging trek up Ben Nevis on the 17th July. To date, they have raised an incredible sum of almost £15,000 to support Cornerstone's work.

Linda's son, Brian told us, "After an 11-year battle with early-onset dementia our wonderful mum, Linda, passed away aged 61, in her own home. By her side throughout was our dad, Tony, who devoted himself to her every need. Sadly, our mum's journey to her final breath was fraught with challenge as we tried to fight a system that fails to provide the right kind of support for young adults with dementia.

"However, one service that helped our family massively throughout our mum's illness was Cornerstone in North Lanarkshire. Cornerstone's Support Workers were able to provide person-centred, practical and emotional support for my mum and our family. As a family, we wanted

to do something to give back to the service that had supported us so much during what was a difficult, often uncertain and upsetting time for us all.

"Over the last few months, we've been walking, running and cycling to prepare for our main fundraising event - our Ben Nevis climb. In the run up, family and friends have been incredibly supportive with our fundraising, and we've now raised almost £15,000 to support Cornerstone.

"Our group of 23 participants, all managed to reach the summit and overcome some difficult weather conditions on the day. We have been overwhelmed with the support and donations from so many different people. We are sincerely grateful for every penny contributed by our loved ones.

"Our fundraising for Cornerstone doesn't stop there. Our local boxing gym MTK are having a charity boxing event at the GM Club in Holytown and they are doing various auctions and raffles for prizes. After hearing our story, they have picked Cornerstone as one of their chosen charities on the night. We're really hoping this will allow us to push our fundraising target that bit more.

"For many people who knew our mum, they will know that she had so much more life left to give and we know that our fundraising achievements, done in her memory, will have a lasting impact allowing Cornerstone in North Lanarkshire to support people living with early onset dementia and their families in similar situations."



Leaving a legacy

At the end of 2020, Cornerstone received a truly incredible legacy gift of over £227,000 from Alexanderina, the mother of the late Mary Williamson, who was supported at Stevenson Court, in Aberdeen. Mary had Down's Syndrome and was supported by Cornerstone for over 23 years.

Mary was very much loved by everyone at Stevenson Court, who have all taken to sharing some fond memories of her recently. 'Mary Doll', as our Service Manager, Malkie liked to call her, will be remembered fondly for dressing up, and her love of parties and holidays. He recalled how much Mary enjoyed a trip to Lovat Lodge in Nairn on Burns Night, watching the haggis being brought in and dancing the night away with her friends and support workers.

To honour Mary's memory, and the wonderful gift that her family gave to Cornerstone we decided to create an annual Personal Achievement Award for the people we support in Mary's name; The Mary Williamson Personal Achievement Award. Mary loved helping others to love life. Through Mary and her mother's incredible gift we will be able to ensure that Mary's legacy is realised through our work, helping the people we support to lead their best possible life for many years to come. Since this incredible gift, Cornerstone has been fortunate to receive another generous gift left in the will of the late Hilda Grant McDonald for £59,295. Hilda lived at Abbotswell Drive beside our Cornerstone service. Allister Kennedy from our Glasgow branch recently secured employment after months of job searching. Gaining a job has increased his confidence. His tenacity and determination will mean a better quality of life for him and his young family. He is going to spend £250 on his family and on items that make him safe when he is outside.

Jamie Boyle from our North Lanarkshire Housing Support branch has achieved lots of personal goals this year. He has tried new foods and even adopted a better bedtime routine which means he is cosy throughout the night. He has managed to eat with stainless steel cutlery and developed a more varied diet. He can now say a few words too. Despite changing provider, Jamie has continued to bring joy to everyone he meets. Jamie is going to spend the £250 on a holiday to Helensburgh next year where he can eat like a king, and buy some new holiday clothes.

Highland Way is the first service of its kind for Cornerstone in Moray as it comprises a number of individual properties. It also represents an important and integral part of the Health and Social Care Partnership's housing plan for adults with a learning disability across the region.

The full development consists of three bungalows and three flats as well as a communal flat which acts as both a staff base and social space for the people supported to come together and meet each other and enjoy various activities. The homes also include state of the art telecare technology, supporting tenants to further develop their independence.

Branch Leader, Elaine Duffy, commented, "We are delighted to be working in partnership with Moray Health and Social Care Partnership and feel really privileged to support the individuals who are moving into Highland Way - it's a really exciting time! The development has allowed six individuals to transition to their own tenancies (many for the first time) and develop an increased level of independence. Through working closely with the new tenants, as well as their families and carers, our skilled support

team are using a person-centred approach to help them settle in quickly, set personal goals, and thrive in their new homes."

As part of a recruitment drive for Highland Way, Moray team member, Morna Hay, is encouraged people to consider a social care career with Cornerstone and to think about applying to join the Buckie team. She said, "The great thing about this job is no two days are ever the same. You'll become part of a team who supports six individuals with various support needs to live in their own homes. Their homes are all situated on the same street, so there will be no travel needed while on shift. Even if you don't have experience don't worry, Cornerstone recruits on values and transferrable skills and will give you all the training you'll need!

"I absolutely love my job and there's always support for staff available any time day or night if you need it. I'd highly recommend anyone thinking about making the move to social care, it's the best thing I ever did."

One of the first tenants to move in has said, "Living in Highland Way is great. The house has plenty of space and is bright and comfortable. It's exciting living in my own house and with help I can do loads of things and get out and about in Buckie to shops and the pub. I can still get the bus to work, too. It's just a shame I have to do the washing up!"

The family of another tenant, Callum, commented, "Callum is so excited to be moving back to his home town in Buckie and being close to all his family. He's so excited about having a bungalow with no stairs and meeting his new support workers. We can't wait and Callum's also feeling happy and can't wait."

Cornerstone's CLASP service, and neighbouring Jigsaw service, both offer active and social activities to children, and provide respite to families across Argyll & Bute. Each year nearly 60 children with learning disabilities, autism and complex needs take part in the regular youth clubs, sports clubs, respite days, parties, and other sessions to meet new people, make friends and discover new hobbies and interests.

Each session is fully staffed by their dedicated care and support team which provides parents and carers some well-deserved time to themselves, safe in the knowledge that their child is well cared for and enjoying themselves.

Over the past few years, the teams at CLASP and Jigsaw have been trialling more adventurous activities to take children out of their comfort zone and show them a side of life they might never have experienced before. Activities like climbing walls, bouldering, horse riding, archery, and sailing have been big hits with the children. Adventures like these have improved confidence, reduced isolation, encouraged friendships and shown the children and young people that they're capable of anything. It's created a team spirit among the children and inspired them to try new adventures.

Team Leader, Frances Wilshin said, "Without this funding, we could never provide activities like these for the children. Seeing the delight on their faces when they first try something like rock climbing or canoeing is so heart-warming. Some of the kids have even started taking on adventures like these on their own. The sense of achievement they feel fills them with pride, confidence, and memories which they can carry into the future."

Thanks to over £23,000 in funding from BBC Children in Need, CLASP and Jigsaw will build on this great work and continue to provide, and seek new, adventures over the next three years for all the children they support. We're excited to see where this work leads and can't wait to see what the children achieve next. Branch Leader, Jesamine Griffin, said, "We are thrilled to continue our partnership with BBC Children in Need. It's funders like this that enable us to offer children something different and we look forward to seeing the smiles on the children's faces after such a challenging year."

The physical part of the award was adapted from a more social event to be weekly hour-long walks during lockdown which they worked hard to complete.

Just Cycle have recently kindly donated a bicycle to our Borders branch which is going to provide incredible opportunities for the people we support. The Roam Tricycle design allows able-bodied riders to take on passengers so the people we support can experience what it is like to ride a bike in a safe but fun way.

Gary, a support worker explained the benefits of having the adapted bike, "The enjoyment and wellbeing that comes from a nice bicycle ride on a nice sunny day and all that fresh air is immensely powerful for body and mind."



Just Cycle put a lot of work into making the bike safe, comfortable and all-terrain ready for the people we support. Workshop Manager, Grant Martin described part of the process of making the bike more accessible. "For comfort we replaced the saddle for a more padded comfortable option and fitted slightly wider tyres, along with new inner tubes to make the ride smoother over rougher ground and lessen the chances of puncturing."

The donation from Just Cycle will provide many opportunities for fun and enjoyable outings, for both the people we support and staff. The people we support can experience idyllic bike rides through paths they might otherwise have been unable to experience. The bike will also provide another form of transport, enabling trips to local towns and beauty spots for picnics and other outings. This will give the people we support a fun day out, and a chance to relax while taking in the beautiful countryside around them.

The bike may also be used to assist the young people we support in the physical section of their Duke of Edinburgh award.



Cooking up a treat

Our day support service in the Borders is finally back, albeit with some restrictions in place! Since reopening we have been working in partnership with families and the local Health and Social Care Partnership to provide a fun, social and skill-building space for the people we support. We are gradually increasing the activities we are able to provide and welcoming new people to the service.

Service Manager, Tracey Turnbull explains how valuable the service is, "Our activities support independence, self-worth and social inclusion to name a few. They also add to the experiences of the people we support and enhance their quality of life by providing a wider range of interests and conversation."

The service teaches life skills, promotes health and wellbeing, provides respite for families, and encourages positive risk taking. Highly skilled colleagues provide physiotherapy programmes, which is an important part of health and wellbeing. These are set to meet the assessed needs of the individuals and aim to help them maintain the best physical health possible. Gym, swimming and boccia activities have started recently which are also invaluable outings.

One of the most notable things about the day support service, which is funded by Scottish Borders Council, is the sense of community; the building of friendships and confidence as the people we support learn new skills together. The cooking group is a great example, giving the people we support the opportunity to learn and make different recipes. Due to COVID these sessions have been limited, but plenty of tasty treats like tray bakes, pizzas, scones and cakes have still been created! Most recently, Charlotte and Matty had a brilliant afternoon in the kitchen making some delicious chocolate truffles. There are still restrictions in place to make sure everyone can get the most out of the activities whilst still being safe, but we look forward to increasing our capacity when restrictions deem it safe to do so.



James loves Riverdance

On the 6th of October James had the exciting opportunity to see Riverdance in Edinburgh alongside support staff member, Derek. Irish music means a lot to James. His favourite band is The Dubliners and he listens to Irish traditional music every night, playing along on his bodhrán, flute or guitar.
